Development	<p>Steve Ramos reported.</p> <p>Woodburn Exchange Blake Bartely, Senior Real Estate Executive at Urban Fast Forward, shared specification details for a retail white box space at the Woodburn Exchange property with DeSales Community Urban Redevelopment (DCDC). The 1,750-sf suite has HVAC, electrical, plumbing, and a finished restroom. We're asking all assembly members and residents to share this business opportunity with any interested parties.</p>	Motion Approved

	<p>Seven Hills School Doherty Campus A May 1, 2025 letter signed by Matthew Bolton, Head of School at The Seven Hills School, and Brett Marcoux, President, Springer School and Center, confirmed that the Seven Hills School will be selling its Doherty Campus in East Walnut Hills to Springer School and Center. Seven Hills will occupy the Doherty Campus in East Walnut Hills through the summer of 2027 before moving teachers, students, and peers to a new Lower School on the Hillsdale Campus in Madisonville. The Doherty Campus will become the future home of Springer School and Center's expanding high school program.</p> <p>1520 Madison Road The large Jones Lang LaSalle Incorporated (JLL) For Sale Sign outside the DDS Building at 1520 Madison Road clearly informs all residents of Hamilton County's plans to sell the property. DCDC members continue conversations with Hamilton County leaders, including Holly Christmann, assistant county administrator for Hamilton County, Michelle Klingenberg, a real estate broker at JLL, and potential developers, to lead the future development of this significant property adjacent to the Woodburn Avenue Business District.</p> <p>Hackberry/Cleinview Historic District DCDC members built upon their work from early 2025, identifying properties supporting an expanded Hackberry/Cleinview Historic District with service inquiries to historic preservation consultants. DCDC committee members continue community outreach and research on the historic district. The next steps are expected to take place in the Fall of 2025.</p> <p>Neighborhood Plan Update After attending the Invest in Neighborhoods March 29 neighborhood summit, DCDC members continued conversations with community development enterprise HomeBase Cincinnati on the next steps supporting an update of the East Walnut Hills Neighborhood Plan. DCDC members continue gathering community feedback, data, and next steps from professional planners.</p> <p>Madison Road Corridor Study The EWH Madison Road Diet Subcommittee presented the Madison Road diet study to the Walnut Hills Working Group at the April 17 meeting. The Walnut Hills Working Group, including the Walnut Hills Redevelopment Foundation, the Walnut Hills Business Group, and the Walnut Hills Area Council, agreed to provide a letter supporting the Madison Road Corridor Study.</p> <p><u>Upon motion and second, the East Walnut Hills Assembly approves the DeSales Corner Urban Redevelopment Corporation (DCDC), sharing a Letter of Support for the developer Urban Sites regarding their proposed development of 1520 Madison Road.</u></p>	
7. Infrastructure	<p>Ryan Crane reported.</p> <p>The TIF request letter for the Madison Road diet study was submitted. O'Bryonville and Walnut Hills neighborhoods and business associations sent a letter of support as well.</p>	None
8. Farmer's Market	<p>Deb reported.</p> <p>The Farmer's Market begins May 30 in the Madison parking lot. There is a great list of vendors. The market is looking for volunteers. Contact Deb via the Farmer's Market email for more information. info@ewhfamersmarket.com</p>	None
9. Pocket Park / Public Art	<p>Deb reported.</p> <p>The committee has applied for The Cincinnati Neighborhood Business District Improvement Program (NBDIP) funding to create a park on Madison Road</p>	None

	next to the fire station. Plans no longer include a water feature, per the city's recommendation. The process to determine funding starts this weekend.	
10. Additional Business	<p>Brian McGlocklin from People Working Cooperatively (PWC) presented to the Assembly. PWC is a 50 year old nonprofit with the mission of helping seniors with disabilities live safely in their homes. The organization is holding their annual volunteer event, Repair Fair, on June 14 for 3-4 hours in the morning. There is then a luncheon at PWC's headquarters in Bond Hill following. More information is in the brochure attached to the meeting minutes. The organization values repair skills, but anyone would be welcome to volunteer. If June 14 doesn't work, but you are still interested, PWC would still love to hear from you.</p> <p>Drew Gores introduced representatives to talk through the Save Hyde Park efforts. City Council approved the zoning change, effectively allowing the development to go forward. The group is collecting signatures to petition and include the issue on the November ballot, repealing the PD designation and stopping the development. The group needs 15,000 signatures by May 23 to be included on the ballot. If you wish to support the efforts, sign the petition and/or visit the website to learn more. https://www.savehydeparksquare.org/</p> <p>Drew asked everyone to acknowledge Freeman Durham's extensive service to the East Walnut Hills Assembly and neighborhood. The Assembly rightfully gave Freeman a standing ovation. Thank you for your service, Freeman.</p> <p>WAIF 88.3FM, located on East McMillan, encouraged the neighborhood to tune in. Volunteers have been running the station for 50 years and would like to be further engaged in the community. The station's schedule is attached to the meeting minutes and/or can be found at the following website. https://www.waifradio.org/</p> <p>Taft roads and sidewalks will be closed Saturday afternoon through Monday due to Vance's return to Cincinnati.</p> <p>The president of Edgecliff informed the Assembly that the Edgecliff won their appeal regarding the development on Columbia Parkway and Kemper. The developer has appealed and Edgecliff is waiting to hear back from the courts.</p>	None

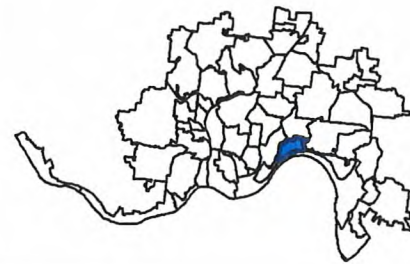

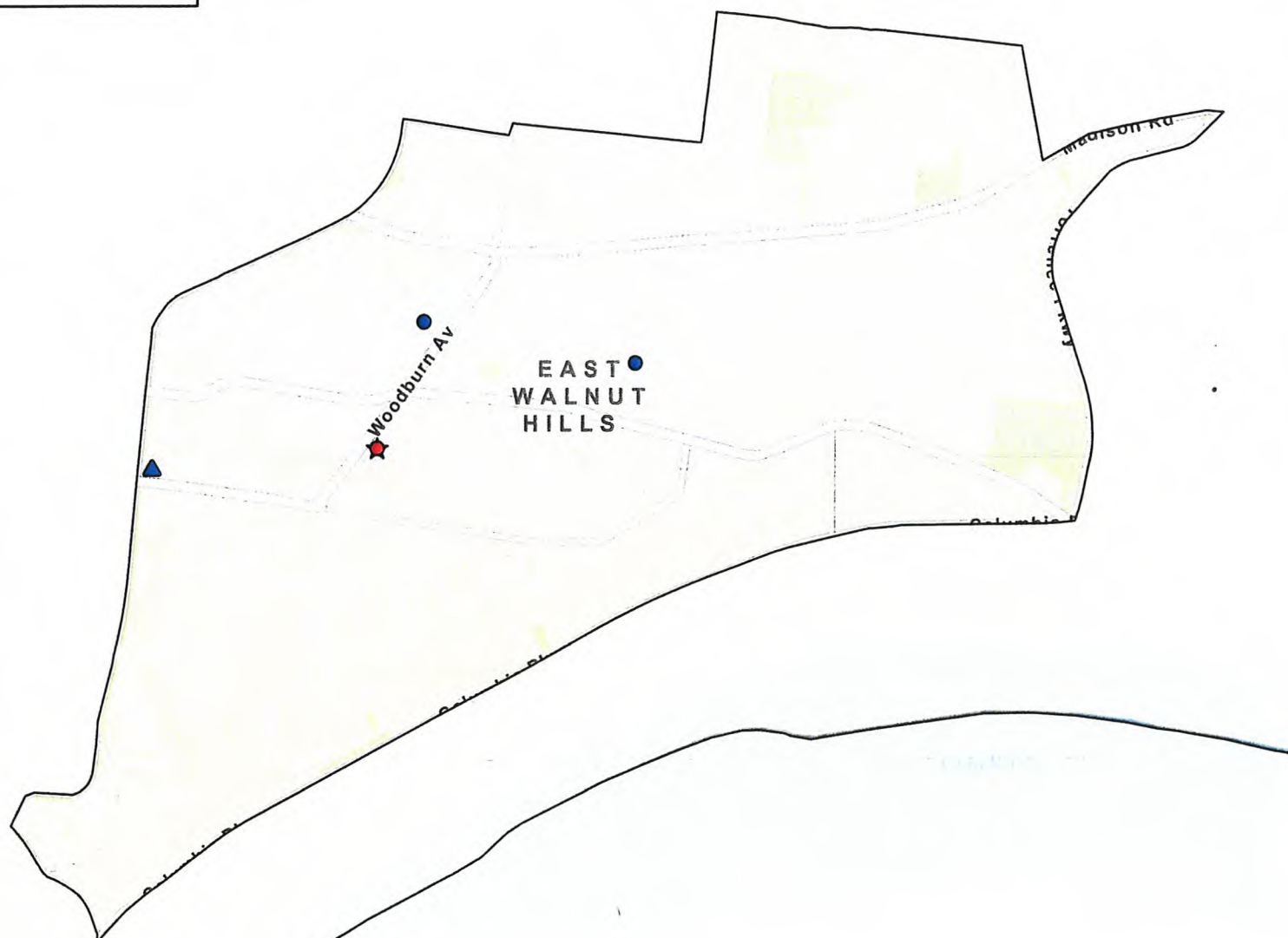
