Welcome	Freeman Durham, President of the EWHA Board, called the Monthly meeting to order at 7:05 p.m. Approximately 19 people attended the meeting in person, and another 12 attended the meeting on Zoom.	None
Cincinnati Police Report	Officer Perry Locke discussed the crime statistics for March 2022 (posted on the website prior to the meeting and attached). Officer Locke highlighted auto thefts are still up and that it's important to never leave car ignition key fobs in the vehicle or in the owner's garage. Officer Locke encouraged the community to lock or shut their garage doors while working in the yard as valuables inside may be left vulnerable. 2. Bush Recreation Center Report	Vanessa Henderson presented. 11-8P is the recreation center hours during the summer. Parent engagement and participation is encouraged in May. The center is looking to put parents through fun activities with the children. May 19th is the Evanston Recreation Center's "Sports Sampler," and is seeking sponsors and vendors. There is a \$30 registration fee. Summer Camp Day Camp is currently still open with approximately 8 spots remaining. Spring Pickleball is beginning. Mt Washington Community Center is putting together summer adventure programs, ages 12-17 encouraged to attend the river trip. Volunteers are important as well, and are encouraged to reach out for more information.	None
3. March Minutes	No minutes were available for approval	None
4. Treasurer's Report.	Vince Accoriniti presented. The finance report was posted on the website prior to the meeting. No income or expenses were noted out of the extraordinary. The Assembly holds a \$30,000 promissory note on a loan to improve the space in the Rainbow Building occupied by Hello Honey. The loan was funded by DCDC, our development corporation, from funds it holds under our community benefit agreement. The loan is only repayable if Hello Honey does well. The balance sheet has been adjusted to carry this note as an asset. The Assembly has now received just over \$2,000 in repayments.	None
5. Membership	Valeric Daley presented. All are encouraged to renew their memberships so that they can vote at the annual meeting in May.	None
6. Events	Christine Johnson presented. April 1st was the Neighborhood Trash Walk, and a local business, Automated Machine Systems, sent about 10 employees to come walk the neighborhood. 3 people from Hamilton Country Health Department came as well, and she reminded the community that the trash walks are the first Saturday of everything month. It was requested to keep the committee informed if there are any areas where trash is beginning to pile up, and the walks will focus on these areas. Volunteers for event committee sign ups, activities, and outcoming are encouraged to participate.	None

	Evanston Fest, Evanston Playground off Dana; September 7th, Cincinnati Music Accelerator; Community Jazzfest, with "Mombocombo," October 7th. Applying for grants to be used in Owls Nest Park, looking for new and interesting events to bring to the community space.	
7. Farmer's Market	Deb Dereshkevich presented. There are currently 25 vendors signed up for the East Walnut Hills Farmers Market. The market will run from the last Friday in May through October ending with Octoberfest. There will be lots of activities for all ages. With raffles, musicians, and weekly grocery shopping, the market is the perfect place for weekly grocery shopping.	None
8. Infrastructure	Ryan Crane presented. The committee has applied for traffic calming grants for the Woodburn & Madison intersection. The application was selected and there will be traffic calming measures implemented in the months to come through the Department of Transportation pedestrian safety program. Speed humps and pedestrian orientation are two important pieces discussed.	None
9. Business Association	Sara Siefring presented. The next Walk on Woodburn will be April 14th, and the art gallery that replaced Originalitees will be closing shortly after as well.	None
10. Parking	Rick Boydston presented. The committee is waiting for the city to come back with a proposal on how to limit permit parking in the Madison lot, as well as on Woodburn. This is part of the negotiations over a new lease for the Madison lot. It is the committee's belief that until the Madison lot is full, this limitation is not necessary. The Woodburn lot's surface repair and repainting project is currently in process, with multiple bids being pursued. Funding for this project is also being discussed. Another update being discussed is the updating of the payment system used for the parking lots, bringing convenience and ease of use to our business district patrons.	
11. Development	Drew Gores presented. The committee reached out to the Woodburn Exchange and received a response regarding the official opening of the apartment complex. The Woodburn Exchange officially welcomed their first residents on 3/1, and is pushing for completing the remaining phased construction of their project. Currently 4.35% occupied, 23% pre-leased, and is estimating an additional 8% by end of April. They have teased the prospective commercial tenant without confirming them by name. A wine bar and cocktail longue is a prospective tenant communicated. Onyx + East anticipating acquiring properties on Woodburn this summer with construction to follow immediately. These properties are between the Purcell Marian stadium project and the Music Resource Center. Rusk Kitchen opening on 4/21. Solstice, the new concept going in next to Symposium, has been quiet on social media but submitted a liquor license application, meaning they are moving forward. The community garden is fenced and boxes are in place. Solicitations for allocating community garden boxes will be based on interest. An application has been filed to designate Hoffman School, an iconic Hannaford & Sons designed building off Woodburn, as a local historic landmark. This application will halt any plans for demolition. Cincinnati Preservation Association submitted the application. The community is encouraged to submit a letter of support, first to the Historic Conservation Board and then to City Council members. The East Walnut Hills Assembly board is submitting a letter of support on behalf of the community. Over 17K people viewed and commented regarding the issue of the Hoffman School's demolition, indicating this to be an important subject matter. Evanston Community Council is currently dealing with the brunt of this development issue, with there was a split vote on the subject. One opposed demolition of the building, but another gave approval for the development of the green space. This school and greenspace are important staples to the community and must act








