1. Cincinnati Police Report	Officer Perry Locke discussed the crime statistics for November 2023 (posted on the website prior to the meeting and attached). Officer Locke highlighted automobile thefts as a central theme, with a continued issue with Hyundai in particular. A call out for porch pirates was noted, informing an opportunity to reduce this theft by having orders delivered to places of work. The crime report reported 1 burglary breaking and entering, 1 theft from auto, 1 other type of theft, and two automobile thefts. With Auto thefts still up, it's especially important to never leave car ignition key fobs in the vehicle or in the owner's garage. Officer Locke encouraged the community to lock or shut their car doors while warming up the vehicle. Now that the District 4 has been combined into District 2, there is now increased officers to ensure officers are not being pulled away for EWH/Hyde Park etc. from district 5. 9. Development	John McHugh presented. The Fix has moved into the location where the Symposium used to be. The Francis/Kemper demolition has largely been completed and will construction will slowly continue through the winter months until they are able to start the construction of approximately 40+ units. On the 3000 block of Woodburn, Onyx + East closed on its purchase of the properties and are in process of developing the foundations of the site now that they have site control. Weather permitting for both developments.	
13. Hoffman School	Drew Gores presented. Last month the Planning Commission held a staff conference regarding the Hoffman School development. The subject of discussion was the proposed rezoning to allow construction of two apartment buildings on this site. Community residents and the developer, Kingsley & Company were in attendance, and many people who spoke against the development as it is currently positioned. Discussion ensued regarding the steps moving forward. The developer intends to come back with a revised plan to address these concerns. It was requested that as many people remain active through this project to ensure alignment with the community's interests.










Veighborhood Crime Report: EAST WALNUT HILLS 8 DAY REPORTING PERIOD

- Have packages delivered to where you are, not to where you aren't. Consider having packages delivered to your office or place of employment instead of your home.
- Use tracking numbers and delivery notifications. Most major shipping companies offer this free service, and can send you a text or email when your package arrives.
- Ask family members, trusted neighbors and friends to accept deliveries on your behalf or to pick-up your packages
- Request packages to be placed in a less conspicuous spot, such as a side door or behind a planter or garbage can. Or invest in a parcel locker/lock box


Many shipping companies now allow you to request delivery time or time frame—

schedule packages for when someone is home.

Install a smart security camera at your front door.

- Request signature on delivery if possible.
- Some companies and shippers offer locker service or for packages to be held at the delivery distribution center for pick-up.

BEAUTIFICATION REPORT

November 24, 2023

With the help of many volunteers, the wreaths were hung in the business district during the Thanksgiving weekend. Thanks to all who helped. The task was not easy as the weather was cold and windy. I have a couple ideas regarding this task. Possibly, we could aim to hang the wreaths before the Thanksgiving holiday on one of those 70-degree days. Also, the possibility of hiring a company to do this work might be a good idea. Lately, I have been trying to attract new younger volunteers who would be willing to climb ladders and hang the wreaths. I have not had much luck. While the "old guard" are ready and willing to hang the wreaths, it may be a safer option to pay a fee and have the work done by a company. If you could mention this at the Board meeting on Wednesday and have a discussion, I would appreciate it. If there is interest, I could collect a few estimates. It may be that the cost would be exorbitant and not possible. I do think the idea is worth investigating.

I am attaching an email that I received from the City Parks regarding an increase in the cost of participating in the pot program. Freeman and Vince are aware of this cost increase and the topic has been included in your agenda for the Board meeting. In summary, the cost per pot will be increased to \$330.00 from \$200.00. We currently have 22 pots along our business district. This would translate to an increase of \$2860.00. The current total cost is \$4400 for the 22 pots. The new cost, should we agree to this increase, will be \$7260.00. The possibility exists that we could reduce the number of pots that we currently have to reduce our cost.

The pots are located along Woodburn Ave from William Howard Taft (south) to Madison Road (north), both sides of the street. Also, there are 2 pots on Madison Rd., one located at the corner of Madison and Moorman and the other located at the side of Bank Bldg (formerly Branch) along Madison Road. Additionally, there are two pots at the border of East Walnut Hills and Walnut Hills across from McDonalds.

The 4 new traffic islands (William Howard Taft and Woodburn, 2 islands along East McMillan near St. Ursula and the Greenspace in front of Palette Studios) which were developed one year ago are all progressing beautifully. Soon the beds will be winterized with the cutting back of plants appropriately. During the winter, I will be planning maintenance for these 4 new islands as well as our gateway island at the intersection of Madison, Victory Pkwy, and MLK. The city replanted this space in September. In the Spring, the city has agreed to water, while our responsibility will be to keep the space maintained.
